<p>Higher Education Price Index (HEPI) and mandatory local fee rate projections</p>	<p>The HEPI shows that inflation for U.S. colleges and universities rose 2.7 % in the fiscal year 2021. It increased compared to last FY's 1.9 % but essentially level with the five-year average of 2.6 %.</p> <p>According to the 2022-23 Budget: California's Fiscal Outlook report, the state will have a \$31 billion surplus to allocate in 2022-23 despite the ongoing global pandemic and its disparate health and economic impacts on Californians. However, given the trends in revenues and spending, State Appropriation Limit (SAL) could be the key issue this year. The state would need to allocate roughly \$14 billion to meet the constitutional requirements under Sal across 2020-21 and 2021-22. While there is significant uncertainty in these figures, Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) estimates the state could have \$12 billion in additional SAL requirements in 2022-23.
